OVERVIEW

Common African Position on Assets Recovery (CAPAR) is a strategic framework adopted by the African Union to address the longstanding challenge of illicit financial flows and the recovery of stolen assets from African countries. It represents a united position by African nations to combat corruption, recover lost assets, and ensure that these assets are reinvested into Africa's development.

CAPAR PILLARS

1. Detection and Identification of Assets

- Focuses on tracing and identifying illicitly acquired African assets.
- Involves strengthening laws for transparency, improving border controls, and leveraging technology for asset detection.

2. Recovery and Return of Assets

- Aims to streamline the process of repatriating stolen assets to African nations.
- Advocates for simplified legal processes, international cooperation, and prioritizing the return of cultural artifacts.

3. Management of Recovered Assets

- Ensures that recovered assets are used for the common good.
- Emphasizes accountability, transparency, and detective management to maximize the impact of returned assets.

4. Cooperation and Partnerships

- Highlights the importance of collaboration among African states, regional bodies, and international partners.
- Encourages the use of existing frameworks and the engagement of civil society and media to strengthen asset recovery efforts.

CHALLENGES ADDRESSED BY CAPAR

- **Illicit Financial Flows (IFF):** Africa loses approximately US\$150 billion annually to IFF, significantly hindering its development.
- **Corruption:** Corruption diverts resources from vital sectors like healthcare and education, exacerbating poverty and inequality.
- **Asset Recovery:** The process of recovering stolen assets is often complex, requiring international cooperation and robust legal frameworks.

CAPAR's STRATEGIC APPROACH

- **Multi-Faceted Communication:** Employing a 360-degree communication strategy involving traditional and digital media, direct engagement, and strategic partnerships.
- **Advocacy and Awareness:** Conducting campaigns to raise awareness about the importance of asset recovery and the role of CAPAR in fighting corruption.
- **Capacity Building:** Enhancing the skills and capabilities of stakeholders involved in asset recovery through training and partnerships.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- **Increased Public Awareness:** Broader understanding of the impact of IFF and the importance of asset recovery.
- **Enhanced Stakeholder Engagement:** Active participation from African states, international partners, and civil society in CAPAR's initiatives.
- **Improved Policy Implementation:** Adoption of policies that support asset recovery and combat IFF.
- **Successful Asset Recovery:** Increase in recovered assets, contributing to Africa's development and poverty reduction.
